

Tumalo Creek, OR

Located just west of ever-popular and sporty Bend, Oregon, Tumalo Creek flows from the eastern flanks of the Cascade Mountains, coursing through forested uplands and then out onto the high desert. The best fishing opportunities on Tumalo Creek begin at the base of scenic Tumalo Falls (about 13 miles west of downtown Bend), and the fishing extends downstream toward Bend. There is good fishing access from points along Skyliners Road (Forest Road 4601), which follows the creek in Deschutes National Forest, and at Shevlin Park, on Bend's western outskirts.

Tumalo Creek is a summer and fall fishery, after the spring runoff. This is a small water, easily covered on a summer day by wet wading and casting to easily identifiable holding water. After runoff, Tumalo Creek flows clear over a stone and gravel bottom, forming numerous riffles and pools that are home to wild redband trout, along with a few wild brook trout. Most are small, though the deeper boulder-strewn runs and pools can hold trout over 12 inches.

Because of Tumalo Creek's diminutive size and clarity, anglers need to be stealthy. Wear muted clothing, and slow when you approach the water; better still, hide and stay away from the water's edge whenever possible. Minimize false



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Parking is available in Shvevin Park at Aspen Hall, Aspen Meadow, and the Shvevin Commons parking lot, as well as spots along Skylineers Road, including the small Tumalo Falls parking lot. A Northwest Forest Pass permit is required for the Tumalo Falls parking area.

At the south end of Drake Park in downtown Bend, Northwest Galveston Avenue crosses the Deschutes River and heads west, becoming Skylineers Road as it heads through the Deschutes River and eventually joins a Deschutes National Forest trail that provides even more access to the best waters. Shvevin Park is 4 miles northwestern of downtown Bend via NorthWest Newport Avenue, which becomes Shvevin Park Road before departing the outskirts of town.

You won't often need to match a hatch on Tumalo Creek, but some days the fish prefer terrestrial insects, in which case you will need foam ants, beetle imitations, Adams, Parachute Adams, Purple Haze, and a selection of caddisfly patterns. For and traditional jassid patterns. Pack fly boxes with attractor dry flies, including the Adams, Parachute Adams, Purple Haze, and a selection of caddisfly patterns. For subsurface work, carry Copper Johns, Phaeasant Tail Nymphs, and Prince Nymphs.
